



## Course Requirements and Assignments

SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, it is expected that students will spend a minimum of forty-five hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on. There are four components to your grade: exams (30%), in-class discussion (30%), student project (25%), and homework assignments (15%).

The exams will have short answer questions, and each will be worth 10% of your final grade. The exams are open book open note. You will be required to upload your answers to our Canvas as pdf files or directly.

Students will participate in several discussions and short quizzes

Students will make a five minute Zoom presentation or write a short paper (i.e., about two to three pages). The projects will discuss the student's choice of American institutions associated economic growth. The final project will be due during week 15/14/23. However, intermediate steps leading up to the final project will be due during the two weeks leading up to week 15.

There will be three homework assignments during the semester immediately before each exam. The assignments will help prepare students for the subsequent exam.
