# **Course Description**

Introduction to Justice Studies examines the historical and philosophical development of the justice system; description, analysis and evaluation of criminal justice agencies, and explores the relationship between theory and practice in the United States. Note: Students must achieve a grade of "C" or better (not C-) to fulfill Justice Studies major requirements. 3 Units.

- 1. Provide an introduction of the characteristics, structure, and processes of justice system operations in the United States.
- 2. Explain criminal law, criminal statistics, and constitutional criminal procedure as it relates to practices within the justice system.
- 3. Describe and discuss the purpose, functions, critical issues, and societal interactions of the three major components of the justice system, which includes the police, courts, and corrections.
