JS171, Online, Human Rights and Justice, Section 86, Fall Semester, 2019

Course Description

Interdisciplinary exploration of human rights instruments, institutions, and notable human rights campaigns. The historical development of human rights and contemporary threats to the realization of fundamental dignity for humans and non-humans will also be explored.

Course Format

This course is online, with class participation taking place in the form of posting to online discussions on Canvas (and assignment descriptions posted to Canvas, and submitted there on will be posted each week, and students are expected to post discussion points at least once a week.

GE Learning Outcomes (GELO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

GELO 1: Compare systematically the ideas, values, images, cultural artifacts, economic structures, technological developments, and/or attitudes of people from more than one culture outside the U.S. This learning objective will be assessed in discussion posts and the in-depth research assignment students submit as their final evaluation.

GELO 2: Identify the historical context of ideas and cultural traditions outside the U.S. and how they have influenced American culture. This learning objective will be assessed by students demonstrating their familiarity with the backgrounds of key instruments in required regular discussion and assignments such as quizzes and essays (as well as discussion posts particularly those that task students with reflecting on set articles/reports/readings). It is also likely to be evident in the in-depth research assignment given that students are tasked with contextualizing human rights issues.

GELO 3: Explain how a culture outside the U.S. has changed in response to internal and external pressures. This learning objective will be assessed in online discussion.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. CLO 1 Read, write, and contribute to online discussion (via Canvas) at a skilled and capable level.
- 2. CLO 2 Recognize and acce according to
