Thequiz format will include multiple choice and True/False questions, fillin-the-blank, and short essays applying the human rights framework to different social and policy issues



Human Rights and Justice Proposal Group project Students will develop a project at utilizes the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as a framework to examine a local human rights issue of their choosing. Students may collaborate on projects in groups of up to 4 but must document their individual contributions to the works assignment asks students to apply course lessons to a readvorld problem addressing sustainability. Students will identify a human rights concern, research the issue, and apply the SDGs to develop a proposal that identifies sustainable address to issue. The proposal will be in a writteformat following:
  - x Project name and Basic description
  - x Authors
  - x Justification or Rationale and Benefits
  - x Background
  - x Project Scope
  - x Implementation Consideration
  - x Which author didwhich components.
