<p>(1) Research, conducted in established or commonly accepted educational settings, that specifically involves normal educational practices that are not likely to adversely impact students' opportunity to learn required educational content or the assessment of educators who provide instruction. This includes most research on regular and special education instructional strategies, and research on the effectiveness of or the comparison among instructional techniques, curricula, or classroom management methods.</p>	<p>Pregnant women Human Fetuses and Neonates (subpart B): exemption applies.</p> <p>Prisoners (subpart C): exemption does not apply except for research aimed at involving a broader subject population that only incidentally includes prisoners.</p> <p>Children (subpart D): exemption applies.</p> <p>Consent: Notice for adults except when other policies require participant written authorization (e.g., FERPA). The research or demonstration project must be published on this list prior to commencing the research involving human subjects.</p>
