A possessive apostrophe shows that a noun has ownership (or possession) of a person, object, idea, or quality.

If the word is a(n):	Add:	Example:
Singular noun	's	girl s, John's, baby's
Singular noun ending in -s	's or' Usage varies; 's is preferred, but using ' is acceptable for multi-syllable words.	Zeus's, Gus's, boss's or Carlos', Arkansas'
Plural noun ending in -s	•	mothers', babies', bosses'
Plural noun not ending in -s	's	children's, mice's, geese's
